THE HISTORY OF THE WORLD CUP COMPETITION

Every 4 years The World Cup finals generate more excitement, more passion, more commitment and more widespread interest than any other sporting event. It is the only spectacle of its kind that can claim to captivate sport enthusiasts from every continent of the globe as the number of competitors are whittled down from more than 120 nations to just two teams of 11 men desperate for football glory and the most coveted individual award of them all—a World Cup winners medal.

The first ever World Cup final was not however the glorious occasion it is today. Only 13 nations entered the 1930 competition and 7 of those were South American teams. Uruguay had been chosen as hosts, officially because they were reigning Olympic champions from 1928 and would celebrate their centenary to coincide with the tournament. Consequently it turned out to be an event of largely South American interest, with the host nation beating Argentina 4-2 in the final in front of 90,000 people. Uruguay were therefore the first nation to lift the Jules Rimet Trophy, named after the then president of FIFA and founding father of the World Cup championship.

Despite the low numbers that entered the inaugural competition, it was Rimet, convinced that the Olympics could no longer represent the 'best' in football because of its ban on professionalism, that campaigned hard to make The World Cup a success. By the time he retired in 1954 his dream had come true with almost 1 million people attending the Finals in Switzerland to see an incredible 140 goals scored and the West Germans lifting the trophy for the first time.

The modern day World Cup is truly an international event of unrivalled proportions. The 1982 final held in Madrid, Spain was watched on television by over one thousand million people worldwide, and the 1986 final stages in Mexico saw an incredible 2,401,480 people go through the turnstiles to see the teams perform.

The ITALY 1990 World Cup Finals are likely to attract the greatest audience for any single sporting event in the history of mankind. The world's footballing nations (including the U.S.A. for the first time since 1950) wait anxiously for June 8th when Argentina (the holders) and Cameroon get the tournament underway for 4 weeks of unparalleled excitement, passion, controversy and of course spectacular skill.

BOBBY CHARLTON

BORN 1937

GREAT PLAYERS
OF THE PAST



Bobby Charlton, son of a miner from Northumberland, became not only one of England's greatest football players, but is also acknowledged all over the world as one of the greatest gentlemen and diplomats the game has ever produced. He began his distinguished career in October 1956 for Manchester United and immediately gave the nation a foretaste of his brilliance by scoring twice in his first full 90 minutes of league football. He went on to score 198 league goals for United in 606 league games, a career spanning 20 years with the 'Red Devils'. His first full international cap was against Scotland in April 1958, just two months after surviving the horrific 'Busby Babes' air crash in Munich. He went on to play for his country 106 times, scoring 49 goals—the highest international goal tally ever achieved by an English player.

Bobby played his last professional match for Preston North End on March 29th, 1975 in front of just 7,000 people following a brief spell as player manager there. However he will always be remembered by the footballing public worldwide for his outstanding contribution to the game both on and off the field.

PELE

BORN 1940

Born Edson Arantes di Nascimento near Sao Paulo in Brazil, Pele is still regarded as the best player the world has ever seen and is indeed a legend in his own lifetime.

His club career began with Brazilian junior side Noroste but it was with Santos that he played an incredible 1200 games and scored over 1,000 goals, including 127 strikes in one season alone—a world record unlikely to be beaten!

As an international Pele was no less spectacular. He scored in his first international (against Argentina in July 1957), and hit the target twice in the World Cup Final against Sweden in 1958. He was still just 17 years old. The World Cup Finals of 1970 in Mexico saw him at his breath taking best, and it was there that his two now legendary flashes of utter genius—the 'wrong way' dummy round the Uruguay goalkeeper, and the shot from his own half versus Czechoslovakia—were captured on film, to be played over and over again on televisions all over the world.

Pele finished his career with the New York Cosmos in 1977 in front of 75,000 people, after 20 years of awe-inspiring football that captured the World's imagination and won a permanent place in the sporting hall of fame.



JOHANN CRUYFF

BORN 1947

Cruyff made his league debut at the age of 19, after 9 years of working his way through the extensive youth programme at Ajax Amsterdam. His natural talent, tenacity, and ability to switch positions with uncanny ease, quickly made him the most feared player in the Dutch league and he scored 33 goals in his first full season.

While his club success is unparalleled in the Netherlands, with three European Player of the Year awards to his credit (1971, '73, '74) his international career was severely restricted by his fiery temperament and early retirement. In only his second international Cruyff was involved in an 'incident' with the referee and was sent off for apparently striking an official. A 12 month ban followed. However his ability to play striker, midfield general and inspired winger all in the same game, established him on the International scene as the most dangerous player of the 1970's—as even the best drilled defences often discovered to their cost.

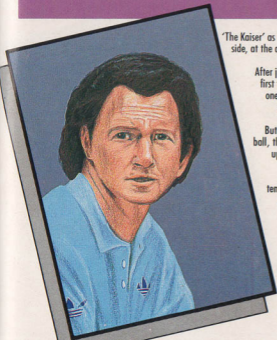
Cruyff became the World's most expensive player in 1974 when he joined Barcelona for £922,000 for whom he won both league and cup medals in Spain before being tempted to the USA for spells with the L.A. Aztecs and Washington Diplomats. Ironically it was with Feyenoord that he finished his playing career, helping them to win the Dutch league title from Ajax in 1984.



GREAT PLAYERS
OF THE PAST

FRANZ BECKENBAUER

BORN 1945



'The Kaiser' as he came to be known, began his career with Bayern Munich's youth side, at the age of thirteen and was responsible for the rise of both his Club and the National Team in the 1960's.

After just 27 first team games (the first on his 18th Birthday) he won his first full cap against Sweden in 1965. By the age of 20 he was not only one of the most accomplished sweepers in the game but also a regular goalscorer, striking fear into domestic, European and International opponents alike.

But it was his abilities as a leader, tactician and supreme passer of the ball, that earned him his nickname and gave West Germany the platform upon which their 1972 European Championship and 1974 World Cup victories were built.

After retiring in 1977 from the German domestic scene, Franz was tempted into joining the New York Cosmos (for a reputed \$2.5 million dollars) before returning to his home country in 1982 to win the league title with Hamburg. He is still actively engaged in guiding his country's footballing fortunes, and was Manager of the West German side that lost in the 1986 World Cup Final to Argentina.

DINO ZOFF

BORN 1942

GREAT PLAYERS

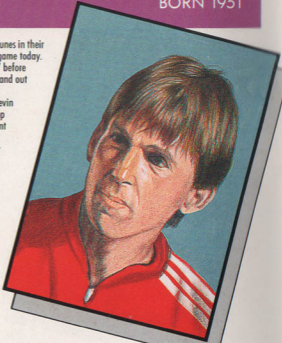


International goalkeeping captains are rare enough, but Dino Zoff's career is unique in many ways. Italy's most capped player with 112 caps, he made his league debut for Udinese in September 1961—and promptly conceded 5 goals! He moved to Mantova the following year where his goalkeeping talents flourished and in 1967 was bought by the mighty Napoli, followed by Juventus in 1972. In 1968 he was called up for his country for the European Championship game versus Bulgaria, but his regular selection was not established until 1974 when, upon starting the World Cup Finals he had set a world record for going an incredible 1,143 minutes without conceding an international goal—only to fall to a strike from lowly Haiti! To be 40 years old and playing in the World Cup is remarkable enough, but to receive the Jules Rimet trophy as goalkeeping captain in Spain 1982 as Zoff did sums up the career of a man who believed in doing things very much his own way!

KENNY DALGLISH

BORN 1951

Despite having the most consistent impact on his national side's fortunes in their history, Dalglish continues to break records in the British domestic game today. He began his football career with non-league Cumbernauld in 1967 before joining Glasgow Celtic and, playing both in midfield and as an out and out striker, scored 112 goals before moving to Liverpool in 1977. The move, south of the border, to replace the 'darling of Anfield' Kevin Keegan was not for the faint hearted. But Dalglish soon had the Kop chanting 'King Kenny' as his inspired vision, leadership and pinpoint passing accuracy helped Liverpool to six league titles. Kenny's influence as an international helped Scotland to qualify for the World Cup Finals in 1974 and 1978 and his 30 goals for his country is a record equalled only by the great Denis Law. His 103 caps, however, has not been equalled and there are many who believe that Kenny Dalglish may yet play a further part in improving his country's fortunes in the international football arena.



GREAT PLAYERS OF THE PAST

MICHEL PLATINI

BORN 1955

One of Europe's most famous and popular players of recent years, Platini began his career with French 2nd Division side Nancy-Lorraine in 1976. It was here that his talent for turning free-kicks into spectacular goals was developed, and his ability to curl the ball round goalkeepers from the most unlikely positions helped gain Nancy promotion to the 1st Division and earn Platini an international football cap in only his first year in professional football.

From 1976 to 1987 Michel Platini thrilled spectators all over the world with chest touches, impromptu back-heels and incisive passing, but it was from free-kicks outside the box that he struck fear into the hearts of domestic and international teams alike. In 72 internationals he scored 41 goals, including 2 hat-tricks in the 1984 European Championships (which France won), and was voted European player of the year three times.

His final match was as captain of his country against a Rest of the World XI in 1987, but following a brief spell away from the game he was tempted back by the chance to manage the national side. Whether he will be as successful off the field as on it, still remains to be seen, but one thing is certain—he will always be remembered as the only European that could beat the Brazilians at their own game—scoring from outside the penalty area.



GREAT PLAYERS
OF THE PAST

GEORGE BEST

BORN 1946



Born and raised in Belfast, George was just 15 years old when the talent scouts of English football giants Manchester United spotted him and whisked him off across the Irish Sea to play in that daunting soccer cauldron called Old Trafford. However, after making his league debut in 1963 and having only 15 full league games behind him, Best made his international debut and established himself as the most talented player ever to come from the Emerald Isle.

Best's most successful season came in 1968 when he was not only the top scorer in the English first division and winner of a European Cup Medal, but was voted European player of the year. His speed, persistence and outstanding genius at close control made him a joy to watch and many talked about him in the same breath as the all time great's such as Pele and Charlton.

Whether he was a victim of the increasingly more pressurised lifestyle his stardom brought him, his own insecurity as a person, or his frustration at never being able to perform regularly in the international arena (as a result of Northern Ireland's poor standing),

George's career soon went into sharp decline. He developed a reputation for indiscipline both on and off the field in 1974, after 361 league appearances, 137 league goals for Manchester United, walked out on the club where he had enjoyed so much acclaim. His next nine years saw him play for Stockport County, Fulham, Motherwell, Hibernian and in the North America Soccer League, before finishing his football career at lowly Bournemouth on the 7th May, 1983. A sad end for a player hailed as the most outstanding talent NEVER to play in the World Cup Finals.

This is Italy's most romantic city, not least because of the pinkish glow that emanates from its beautiful re-coloured, marble buildings and spreads itself over the River Adige whenever there is a full moon in the sky. It is little wonder then that Shakespeare chose it as the setting for Romeo and Juliet, the most romantic story of all time. Verona is also home to some of Italy's most famous wines, notably Valpolicella, Bardolino and Soave, and its peaches are sold all over Italy.

MILAN

GIUSEPPE MEAZZA
CAPACITY 83,407

Unlike most other Italian cities, Milan's skyline is dominated by skyscrapers not ancient monuments, and its boutiques outnumber restaurants three to one. It is a busy and industrious European trade centre, whose culture is truly cosmopolitan, and at the forefront of all that is new in fashion, leisure and the arts. The sleek Pirelli tower built in 1959 stands over the city as a symbol of its preference for the modern over the ancient, and is one of the tallest buildings in Europe. Ironically though, one of Italy's most traditional and enduring pastimes has its most well known venue in this least traditional city. La Scala, the most famous Opera House in the world provides the Milanese with the best in old and new Italian culture.

TURIN

STADIO COMUNALE
CAPACITY 71,362

Cars, food and religion dominate this most westerly of World Cup venues that will host the great Brazilian squad during the first phase. The Italian love of fast cars rivals even their love for football, and it is in Turin that two of the greatest motor manufacturers, Fiat and Lancia, are based. Not surprisingly a large number of the city's workers are employed in the automotive and related industries, and therefore there is little concerted effort to attract tourists. However, Turin has, unwittingly it seems, become the focus of international attention and much religious debate over the past few years—and all because of a piece of cloth. The Shroud of Turin is claimed by some to be the very piece of fabric that Christ was wrapped in for burial following his crucifixion, and bears the visible imprint of a body as evidence.

UDINE

FRIULI
CAPACITY 42,311

The smallest of the World Cup towns with a population of 103,000, Udine was almost completely rebuilt following a disastrous earthquake in 1776. It is the most northerly venue, close to the borders of both Austria and Yugoslavia. The town itself stands on a mound supposedly built by Anillo the Hun so that he may watch the burning of Aquileia, then an important Roman centre to the south. From this somewhat ruthless beginning Udine became peacemaker in the 16th century when the treaty between France and Austria was signed just 3 miles from the town centre, signalling the end of Napoleon's first campaign in Italy (1797).

GENOA

LUIGI FERRARIS
CAPACITY 44,800

This sprawling north-western city that will host two of Scotland's first round games, has three claims to fame. Firstly it is Italy's greatest seaport, handling 1000s of tonnes of European and World shipping every day. Secondly Genoa claims to be the birthplace of arguably the most internationally popular article of clothing ever, blue jeans. Originally called "Le blu di Genova" they were allegedly first worn by the city's dockworkers. The third boast, though disputed by some other Italian towns, is its claim to have invented Ravioli. It was originally developed to use up left over scraps of meat, cheese and pasta dough at a time when a dockworker's wage did not permit the luxury of waste.

THE VENUES

A guide to the towns and cities that will play host to the teams and supporters in the 1990 World Cup Finals.

BOLOGNA

RENATO DALL'ARA
CAPACITY 41,200

Bologna has two nick-names that help to describe the nature of the city and its inhabitants. It is often called 'Bologna La Dotta' (Bologna the learned) on account of it being the home of the oldest University in Europe.

This not only gives the city an enormously rich intellectual heritage, but endows it with a modern, vibrant culture of students and attracts headline bands from all over Europe.

The second nickname, while less complimentary alludes to the city's claim to be the gastronomic capital of Italy.

'Bologna la Grassa' (Bologna the Fat) humorously refers to the delicious range of sausages and pasta dishes available in Bologna, including the most famous of all—Spaghetti BOLOGNESE!

FLORENCE

STADIO COMUNALE
CAPACITY 49,000

The intellectual and artistic centre of Italy, Florence is home to Michelangelo's most famous statue 'David' and offers breath taking views up and down the River Arno from the world famous Ponte Vecchio bridge.

Every year two teams of 27 players meet in the Piazza Signoria to play a mediaeval version of football known as Calcio Storico, with a wooden ball and in front of a capacity crowd.

This has been happening for more than 100 years and is the basis of the claim that the game was invented in Florence, not England as is widely believed.

BARI

DELLA VITTORIA
CAPACITY 60,500

Situated towards the 'heel' of Italy on the south east coast, Bari is the cultural nucleus of the region and the principal ferry point for travel to and from Yugoslavia across the Adriatic sea. Despite its size and 'fishing village' appellation, Bari has an interesting historical significance. For it is here that St. Nicholas, Bishop of Myra in Asia Minor, is reputed to have achieved fame by resurrecting three children whom a butcher had cut up and put in brine. The feast of St. Nicholas on the 8th of May is one of the town's annual attractions and is celebrated at sea with boats full of people praying before the saints statue. It is the same St. Nicholas whose bones now lie beneath the 11th century Basilica in Bari that bears his name, that was later to become Father Christmas or Santa Claus.

NAPLES

SAN PAOLO
CAPACITY 83,311

In Roman times Naples was a favourite holiday resort for great emperors like Augustus, Tiberius and Nero who travelled down the west coast from the capital city. Today Naples is a city of dense, hectic and dangerous traffic, excellent food, and home to some of the best soccer talent in the world. This despite the fact that many of its buildings were severely damaged by an earthquake in November 1980, and the volcano Vesuvius dominates the skyline, a thin wisp of smoke curling over its momentarily tranquil peak. Neapolitans love their food and are masters of the artful combination of two classic Italian ingredients—spaghetti and seafood.

CAGLIARI

SANT'ELIA
CAPACITY 44,200

When God made the countries of the world, he had a small amount of dirt left over which he threw into the Mediterranean sea and stepped on it. This became Sardinia.

So the story goes, but the island is in fact one of the most picturesque sun spots in the whole of Italy. Cagliari itself is the chief port, capital and home to a large pink flamingo population for large parts of the year. Today it is a busy, bustling city of some quarter of a million native Sardinians, but its history is one of constant invasion since pre-Roman times.

The invasion of 1990 is likely to be no less passionate than the previous ones, as the supporters of England, Holland, Republic of Ireland and Egypt converge on Cagliari in search of soccer glory.

PALERMO

DELLA FAVORITA
CAPACITY 40,632

One of the two venues situated off the Italian mainland, Palermo is the provincial capital of Sicily, the largest island in the Mediterranean. As well as being the traditional home of the Mafia, Sicily is dominated by the largest active volcano in Europe, Mount Etna, whose eruptions throughout history have periodically devastated parts of the island.

Palermo is a busy tourist town and part with a population of around 700,000. Like most Mediterranean islands seafood is not only the staple diet but a speciality, especially 'pasta ca seada' (sardines with fennel) and 'pescu spada' or swordfish.

ROME

STADIO OLIMPICO
CAPACITY 84,800

Rome, capital of the world's greatest empire to which it gave its name, principal seat of Christianity after the collapse of the ancient civilisations and the cultural home of the museum, art gallery and monument, is nicknamed 'The Eternal City' for good reason. For rather than let its greatest historical assets become museums themselves the Italians use Rome to its full—their are concerts in the classical ruins, live football games projected onto vast screens in the majestic piazzas, and the fish market in the portico of the pantheon has been there now for almost 1000 years.

It is fitting that Rome, home of great historical events, should host the modern day equivalent and be able to relive the great coliseum traditions as the world's greatest sporting spectacle reaches its climax.

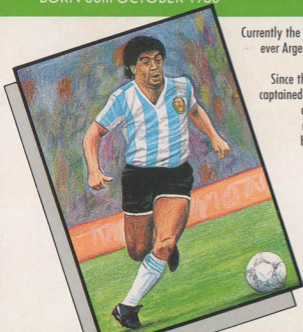

DIEGO MARADONA

BORN 30th OCTOBER 1960

ARGENTINA



Currently the undisputed world No. 1 player, he was the youngest ever Argentinian international when making his debut versus Hungary in 1977 at the age of 16.

Since then he has earned more than 60 international caps, captained his country to World Cup victory in Mexico '86, and dazzled audiences all over the world with his tireless running, amazing ball skills and remarkable vision. He joined Napoli from Barcelona in 1984 for a world record fee of around £6.9 million.

CARECA

BORN 5th OCTOBER 1960

BRAZIL

Made his international debut in 1982 against Czechoslovakia, but missed the Finals in Spain through injury.

A prolific goalscorer, Careca was one of the outstanding players of the last World Cup, leading the Brazilian attack and scoring 5 goals (including 2 against Northern Ireland). He was top scorer in the Brazilian national championship in 1986-7 (25 goals) before being sold by Sao Paulo to Napoli where he now forms a lethal striking partnership with Maradona.



RUUD GULLIT

BORN 1st SEPTEMBER 1962

HOLLAND

Two years younger than Maradona, Ruud Gullitt was voted European Footballer Of The Year in 1987 and is currently the only player in the world that realistically challenges the Argentinian ace for the world No. 1 spot. He made his international debut in 1981 against Switzerland while with Haarlem, but it was at Feyenoord from 1982 to 1985 that he blossomed as an outstanding all round footballer, able to act as sweeper, midfield general, winger or out and out striker as the situation demanded.

After 3 Dutch championship medals (2 with PSV Eindhoven) he moved to A.C. Milan in 1987 for a staggering £5.5 million, before displaying his remarkable talents in the 1988 European Championship, helping Holland to their first ever major international honour.



GIANLUCA VIALI

BORN 9th JULY 1964

ITALY



Hailed as the 'New Paulo Rossi', Vialli is carrying many of the hopes of the passionate Italian supporters on his young but experienced shoulders. He is quick, strong, skilful and always hungry for goals, much to the delight of his club Sampdoria who have benefited from his abilities since 1984. He has helped Sampdoria to win the Italian Cup no less than 4 times, not just by scoring goals with both feet but by harrying defenders, tackling in midfield, and running tirelessly at all times.

Since his international debut in 1985 he has grown into a truly world class striker, helped by having had the opportunity to play in the same team as Liam Brady, Trevor Francis and Graeme Souness. With the experience gained in the 1986 World Cup and 1988 World Championships Vialli will be determined to make the 1990 Finals a personal triumph as well as a national one.

GARY LINEKER

BORN 30th NOVEMBER 1960

ENGLAND



England's golden boy began his career with Leicester City in the 1978/1979 season and was the Midland club's top scorer for 4 successive seasons before joining Everton in 1985. Here he established himself as one of the league's most prolific marksmen, scoring over 30 goals in his first season and making the England centre forward position very much his own. In the 1986 World Cup Finals Lineker joined all time soccer greats like Eusebio, Muller and Kempes on the World Cup Leading Scorers' list with 6 goals. This included a hat-trick against Poland, the first in a World Cup match by an England player since Geoff Hurst in the 1966 final. Lineker's move to Barcelona after the World Cup was, at least at first, a great success both personally and for the club. But illness and a management change forced Gary to move on and in 1989 he joined Tottenham Hotspur, renewing his partnership with ex Barcelona manager Terry Venables.

EMILIO BUTRAGUENO

BORN 22nd JULY 1963

SPAIN

Nicknamed 'El Buitre' or 'The Vulture', Butragueno earned himself headlines all around the world in 1986 when he scored four goals against Denmark—the greatest scoring feat in The World Finals since the great Eusebio's four against North Korea in England in 1966.

His form with Real Madrid has been no less explosive where he has won 2 UEFA cup, 4 Spanish Championships and 1 Spanish Cup winners' medal in only 6 seasons with the club. While his goals are often less than spectacular, it is his tireless running and chasing that forces the defensive errors on which he pounces and heads for goal.



ALLY McCOIST

BORN 24th SEPTEMBER 1962

SCOTLAND

Ally joined Glasgow Rangers in June 1983 after spells with St. Johnstone and Sunderland and quickly established himself as one of the best strikers ever to pull on the famous blue shirt. His international career began in 1986 against Holland and he is Scotland's main hope in attack, working alongside Rangers team mate Mo Johnston. However, despite his 20 caps McCoists' scoring rate for his country has not so far matched his impressive club record—a situation he will no doubt hope to rectify in Italy this year!



RUDI VOLLER

BORN 13th APRIL 1960

WEST GERMANY



A former Bundesliga top scorer and 'Footballer Of The Year', Rudi Voller is currently the West Germans' most complete striker with 60 caps. He is no stranger to The World Cup occasion, and is one of the four players left in Beckenbauer's squad that played in the last World Cup Final versus Argentina in 1986.

Voller is likely to partner Jurgen Klinsmann up front and his experience, technique and goal instinct will no doubt help the younger striker to play to his full potential.

His transfer from Bremen in 1987 cost Roma £3.8 million.

DRAGAN STOJKOVIC

BORN 3rd MARCH 1965

YUGOSLAVIA



Made his debut for Yugoslavia against France in Zagreb in November 1983 at just 18 years old, while playing for Radnicki Nis. He then joined Red Star Belgrade in 1986 for a transfer 'swoop' reputedly of 5 players and a set of floodlights!

Hailed as his country's most talented striker, and with 26 caps to his name already, Stojkovic is likely to emerge from The World Cup as one of the stars of 1990.

Not surprisingly his new club Marseille have had to pay the price for his promise—a reputed £5 million in transfer fees upon his arrival there after The World Cup Finals.

JOHN ALDRIDGE

BORN 15th SEPTEMBER 1958

REPUBLIC OF IRELAND

John joined Real Sociedad in 1989 after extremely successful spells with Oxford United (he holds the record as their all time top scorer) and Liverpool. Whilst many thought that Aldridge would fail to live up to expectations as Ian Rush's replacement at Anfield, he proved himself as one of the UK's most prolific goalscorers, and only moved abroad following injury, which cost him his regular first team place.

His career so far at the Spanish first division club has been no less successful, and he already has his name in the record books for scoring in 6 consecutive matches. He has also found his scoring touch for his country now, netting 2 in their final qualifying match against Malta.
